### Williams to Speak On Negro Housing

James N. Williams, the Executive Director of the Urban League of Rhode Island, will speak at the Resident Fellows' luncheon today in the President's Dining Room.

In his talk, "Racial Discrimination in Rhode Island", Williams will explain the problem of how to move the Negroes out of their present houses and integrate them into new housing developments, despite the present racial discrimination that exists in Rhode Island. Williams said that the housing situation is the cause of most of the tension and conflict that exists between the races in the state. The Negro is the most poorly housed group in the state and he will explain some of the factors contributing to this situation.

He will also talk on the future of the Negro on the College Hill area and the plans that are being made to provide better developments in the various Negro sections about the city.
