

Indian Museum In Bristol Will Expand Exhibits

More than one day is required to see everything in the Haffenreffer Museum of the American Indian in Bristol, a gift to Brown University by the family of the late R. F. Haffenreffer, members of the Bristol Historical Society were told last night by Dr. J. Louis Giddings Jr., its director.

Dr. Giddings, an anthropologist and archaeologist who has introduced the study of anthropology at Brown, outlined his plans to install an exhibit of primitive art in the museum at Mt. Hope to contrast with the American section.

He said his planned exhibit will include pieces mainly from the Pacific Ocean areas, Africa and Asia.

Expansion of the museum will make it valuable to the town, Dr. Giddings observed. He said it is his desire and that of the university to make it a modern, active university museum open to the public. Currently, it can be visited by the public on weekends. He further said the university desires to make it a pleasant place for children as well as adults, one that can be used for teaching and by the public in many ways.

Currently, he said, he plans to sort the collections and place them in new cases "so they can tell a story."
