

Brown to Offer More Courses In Anthropology

Growing student interest in anthropology courses being given in the sociology department at Brown University has led to planned expansion of the department, with doubling of the number of such courses and change of its name to the department of sociology and anthropology, Brown announced yesterday.

Approximately 150 undergraduates are now taking anthropology courses in the department, which is headed by Dr. Kurt B. Mayer.

Dr. J. L. Giddings, associate professor of sociology and director of the university museum at Bristol, now teaching three anthropology courses, has been promoted to full professor, effective July 1, with the title of professor of anthropology.

Additional courses in anthropology will be taught by Dwight B. Heath, now a graduate fellow at Yale University, who will join the department as instructor July 1. He will take over one course now being taught by Dr. Giddings.

The museum at Bristol, formerly the Haffenreffer Museum of the American Indian, is to be expanded gradually, with the aim of making it a general museum of anthropology.
